



St. Theophylact on the Persistent Prayer of the Canaanite Woman

Somehow, this woman from an ungodly region heard of Christ and beseeches him on behalf of her daughter. Why this woman's daughter was demon possessed, we are not told. But her opening words are, "Have mercy on me..." The Lord's initial reaction to her plea: silence. It reminds me of the many times I have petitioned God for something in prayer and felt no answer, even though what I ask for seems to be good.

When petitioning God for what we know is good - our spiritual healing and salvation - we must persevere. Some of the saints would petition God only to have mercy on them. They would then leave it up to God to decide how to fulfill that request. It may seem like God is silent as we continually struggle with sin, but coming before him with constant intercession is part of the healing process.

Saint Xenophon, his wife Maria, and their sons Arcadius and John, were noted citizens of Constantinople and lived in the fifth century. Despite their riches and position, they distinguished themselves by their simplicity of soul and goodness of heart. Wishing to give their sons John and Arcadius a more complete education, they sent them off to the Phoenician city of Beirut.

By divine Providence the ship on which both brothers sailed was wrecked. The waves tossed the brothers ashore at different places. Grieved at being separated, the

brothers dedicated themselves to God and became monks. For a long time the parents had no news of their children and presumed them to be dead.

Xenophon, however, already quite old, maintained a firm hope in the Lord and consoled his wife Maria, telling her not to be sad, but to believe that the Lord watched over their children. After several years the couple made a pilgrimage to the holy places, and at Jerusalem they met their sons, living in asceticism at different monasteries. The joyful parents gave thanks to the Lord for reuniting the family.

The parents Xenophon and Maria went to separate monasteries and dedicated themselves to God. The monks Arcadius and John, having taken leave of their parents, went out into the wilderness, where after long ascetic toil they were glorified by gifts of wonderworking and discernment. Our venerable father Xenophon and his wife Maria, laboring in silence and strict fasting, also received from God the gift of wonderworking.



Sunday of the Canaanite Woman

In today's Gospel reading, we find a woman in great need: her daughter is horribly demon-possessed. In such situations, when you experience pain, you do things that you wouldn't do under other circumstances. Just so, this Canaanite woman runs with determination to receive that which she seeks. First, her great faith and second, the depth of her humility, give her complete conviction that she will receive that which she desires. And her entire conversation with Christ develops gradually, in a remarkable way.





- 2. Christ says something, but in a way that prohibits any such help: "I was not sent except to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." (Everyone who wants to find God will feel that he is rejected by Him.) Humility makes the woman insist: "Lord, help me". The Canaanite woman is not affected; she does not take offence. In this way, humility holds the door of God's mercy open.
- 3. With Christ's final response: "It is not good to take the children's bread and throw it to the little dogs", one would expect the woman to get up and leave. Her faith, however, informs her and she humbly responds: "Yes, Lord, yet even the little dogs eat the crumbs which fall from their masters' table." (When you are humble, you know what to say to the Lord.) Following the whole of this trial the Canaanite woman is made worthy to hear from the Lord: "O woman, great is your faith! Let it be to you as you desire." He does not simply say: "Your faith has saved you ..."

And what about us? I wonder, will we go down, one step at a time, just as the Canaanite woman did? Will we accept whatever the Lord permits so that we stay faithful until we receive our desired end, our salvation?
