Simeon, tell us, whom you bear in your arms, that you rejoice so greatly in the Temple? To whom do you shout and cry aloud: "Now I am set free, for I have seen my Savior?" This is He who was born of a Virgin; this is God the Word, Who came forth from God, Who, for our sakes, has taken flesh and has saved man. Let us worship Him! (Vespers for the Encounter of Our Lord)

The Feast of the Meeting of the Lord was first observed in the Eastern Church as "The Encounter." In the sixth century, it began to be observed in the West: in Rome with a more penitential character and in Gaul (France) with solemn blessings and processions of candles, popularly known as "Candlemas." This feast day concludes the celebration of the Nativity and with the offerings of the Virgin Mother and the prophecy of Simeon, the events now point toward Easter-Pascha.

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FOR CONSIDERATION

If you train yourself in this knowledge, you will attain a higher level of saving vigilance.

Men's Club Meeting



Sunday of Zacchaeus

At that time, Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through. And there was a man named Zacchaeus; he was a chief collector, and rich. And he sought to see who Jesus was, but could not, on account of the crowd, because he was small of stature.

In the Eastern Church, the Gospel account of Zacchaeus is read on the last Sunday preceding the liturgical preparation for the Great Fast. We see two exegetical aspects: Jesus' call to Zacchaeus to come down from the tree (symbolizing the divine call to humility), and Zacchaeus' subsequent repentance.

The chief tax collector of Jericho Zacchaeus wanted nothing more than to be able to see Jesus from afar. He had no other expectations. What happened next was completely unexpected. Our Lord noticed the opening in Zacchaeus' heart and welcomed it as an invitation.

For a brief moment Zacchaeus stops worrying about the future and begins to live in the present moment. He is presented with a simple dilemma that propels him out of his dark fantasies of survival into the living light of the present moment. How can I lift myself high enough to see Jesus over the crowd...now? That is the operative word, NOW. Living in the present helps to soften the heart and open the walls of our cocoons for one simple reason: there is no salvation in the past or the future. The past is a memory, the future is a fantasy. Salvation can only be found in the present moment. The Lord is present with us in reality. Zacchaeus latches onto that necessary truth and discovers that the Kingdom of Heaven is truly at hand. The Kingdom of Heaven can only be found in the present because life is no where else but here and now.

"Hurry and come down, Zacchaeus, for I will dine at your house TODAY." This is the word we proclaim together at the Great Blessing of the Water. TODAY! "Christ is in our midst", NOW. "Christ is Risen", not was. TODAY is the word that begins the Fifteen Antiphon on Holy Thursday. "TODAY is hung upon the Tree." TODAY! NOW! St. Paul writes that TODAY is the day of salvation. The Church wants us to live in the present so that we can see the Kingdom of Heaven which is in the present. The past is a memory, the future is a fantasy. Salvation is always NOW.

Today we bless Candles...Why?

A candle is a small piece of light. Long ago candles and oil lamps were the only ways people could have light at night. They would bring these "bits of light" to the first Christian gatherings in the catacombs and other secret places. Soon the candles became a way of praying, of giving something back to God. The interpreter of the Liturgy, our venerable father Simeon of Thessalonica (XV century), said that pure wax symbolizes the purity and innocence of people offering it. The wax is offered as a sign of our repentance for our obstinacy and willfulness. The softness and malleability of the wax speak of our readiness to obey God. The flame of the candle shows the warmth of love to God.



Candles are used in all Eastern Churches. It is our practice that when we enter the Church, we are to stop to buy a candle. It's our sacrifice. When we light a candle before an Icon and say a prayer for someone, we tell God that we are praying for that person and as long as our candle burns our prayer will be there before God. We say to our friends who are sick or troubled that we will light a candle for them. We light candles for someone who has died. Sometimes we light a candle to say "thank you" to God. We should not put up a candle just for the sake of the ritual, with our hearts remaining cold. The outward action must be supported by a prayer, be it even a simple one expressed in your own words.

Even today when we have electric lights, we do not want to give up praying with those small "bits of living light". They remind us that our souls should burn with love for God and our neighbor for we are called to be living candles. As we will bless the candles for the Feast of the Encounter of Our Lord remember that "You are like a light of the world. You are like a candle in a dark room. Don't hide your light. Let your light shine for everyone to see!" When we see so many candles everywhere, we know that Jesus is everywhere in the whole Church, our homes, and He is in us, too.

Now You shall dismiss your servant, O Lord, according to your word, in peace; because my eyes have seen your salvation which You prepared before the face of all people. a light to the revelation of the Gentiles, and the glory of your people, Israel.
